FROM THE HELM

A tour Annual Meeting (May 20) the members of this community elected three new board members: Kathleen Jones, Jerry Koppang and Todd Wallin. These new members replace Roy Dohner, Dave Ontiveros and Marilyn Moon. I wish to thank the departing Board members for their leadership and dedication to the community both during their term of office and for their many other contributions to Niguel Shores over the years. We will miss their wise counsel, which at all times was given with the best interest of the community as its guiding principle.

The members of this community also approved a Special Assessment to fund the replacement of our aging MPR. The special Assessment was approved by 55% of the members voting. This positive result is the crowning achievement for the untiring efforts of many members of the Niguel Shores Community over a number of years stretching back to January 2003, when Roy Dohner was appointed by the Board to develop a master plan for renovation of the aging community center.

The first achievement of this initiative was the construction of the new office building under the leadership of Don Johnston. The next major event was the formation of MPR Renovation Committee, chaired by Rob Rifkin. Charged with the responsibility of developing an architectural plan and cost estimate to replace the MPR, the team developed an architectural plan that was presented to and approved by the community. At the same time, the Finance Committee, chaired by Marcy McNulty, investigated financing options for the project, leading to the recommendation for the Special Assessment.

Congratulations and thank you, to all the volunteer members of the community who contributed to this ongoing renovation process for Niguel Shores, and to our General Manager, Leo Riley and all the Niguel Shores staff.

The Officers of the Board of Directors for 2008/2009 are: John P. Dougherty, President; Pat O'Brien, 1st Vice President; Jerry Koppang, 2nd Vice President; Todd Wallin, Chief Financial Officer; and, Kathleen Jones, Secretary.

The first job of your new Board of Directors will be to establish a team responsible for the development and implementation of the detailed design, bidding and construction of the new MPR.

Your board is committed to completing this project in a timely manner within the funds provided by your approval of the special assessment.

NNUAL MEETING AND ELECTION RESULTS— Thank you to all who participated in this years longawaited Annual Election. It was a full house when the Inspector of Elections announced the results.

The total number of authenticated and validated ballots was 704 which represents an astounding 73 percent of the homes in Niguel Shores. There were three (3) official nominated candidates and eight (8) unofficial write-in candidates. The number of votes received by the candidates are: Kathleen Jones – 478, Jerry Koppang – 471, and Todd Wallin –442. The other 8 write in candidates each received one vote. John Dougherty was nominated and voted into the position of Board President; Pat O'Brien was appointed First VP, Jerry Koppang, second VP, Kathy Jones, secretary & Todd Wallin, treasurer & CFO. You can read the full summary of other Board positions and committee liaison appointments in the Board Action Summary article in this newsletter.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT—The other big news of the evening, of course, was the approval of the Special Assessment to go forward with replacing the MPR building. You will hear about this in the next issue, but generally the plan would be to begin demolition around November 1 and be completed by summer 2009. We all owe special thanks for the hours and hours of volunteer work that went to getting this project to the approved stage.

Have there been any violations or claims enforced against the contractor? There is a Website that will provide this information and more. We use it and so should you. It is www.cslb.ca.gov or, you can call 800-321-2752. You can check a license by personal name, company name or license number. Tab on QUICK HITS and go to LICENSE SEARCH and enter what information you have. This Website has a wide variety of information and free pamphlets, for example, What Seniors Should Know before Hiring a Contractor. It is not just for seniors and has valuable advice. Hope this information helps when you start your next project and will save you some problems when something goes wrong with your job, the price or the contract.

MAINTENANCE

A day in the life of a Niguel Shores Maintenance Man.

What do our Maintenance guys do all day? If you wonder or ask that question, it probably means that they are doing their job very well. When things are going right, their work will often go unnoticed. But, for those of you who want to know a little more we asked our lead maintenance man to log his activities for one day. Following is the Tuesday, April 29 log from Dave Smith:

4:40 a.m. – Unlock side door to MPR. Turn on pool lights. Unlock pool gates, tennis courts, spa gate and bathrooms. Go to pool, inspect and see if it needs vacuuming. Go to pool room. Inspect pumps, heaters, look for leaks. Someone turned off the emergency shut off switch at the spa so I needed to reset the timer. Turned on spa and checked to see if the heater was working properly (yesterday it was not and did an adjustment to the breather). Set up vacuum for the pool. Checked the chlorine and acid drums. Turned pool lights off.

5:20 a.m. - Left the community parking lot with truck and drove to check street light conditions and open the beach parking lot vehicle gate and unlock pedestrian gate to the parking lot by Breakers Isle gate. Today I drove from Niguel Shores Drive to Leeward, Marlinspike to Selva Gate. Dim mushroom light observed on Flying Jib. A light is out at the Selva Gate entrance; one of the concrete bollards. Drove to Manta and Garibaldi Gates to inspect. Looks good from the outside but no time to go inside today. The vandalized light I repaired yesterday on Tazman is working. Drove down Atlantic, Niguel Shores Drive and Ports-O-Call and checked for trash in the street as well as look for light outages. Lights out at Mercator entrance again. This is the fourth time in a couple weeks due to a contractor damaging our wire. Unlock beach parking lot vehicle gates. Drove down to beach bluff and checked for the trash situation (need to come back later for trash run). I head back to the shop.

5:50 a.m. – Turn pool lights back on and vacuum pool.

6:15 a.m. - Pool ready for swimmers.

 $6{:}30 \text{ a.m.} - \text{Spa}$ vacuumed chemicals adjusted and ready for users.

6:40 a.m. – Pool chemistry tested. I take a 5 minute break. I think to myself, "Good morning so far; nothing broken and just a few lights out."

6:45 a.m. – Pick up trash in parking lot. George arrives to work and we discuss the day's plan. As soon as possible get down to the beach to repair leaky plumbing at the beach shower that was just installed last week. George came by at 9:45 p.m. last night to shut the water supply valve off to the shower, undo a coupling at the shower and let the line drain overnight. Start locating tools and supplies needed for the shower fix.

7:12 a.m. – Filled out chemical test log for pool.

7:20 a.m. - Started loading George's and my trucks with tools to fix the shower at the beach.

7:30 a.m. – Started working on shower leak with George. I am having problems with torch not freeing the elbow that

needs to be re-soldered. I am having other problems with the torch and moisture in pipe still.

8:30 a.m. - Came back to the shop to get another propane tank. Talked to Frank and Dennis on the day's events. Gave them direction.

9:00 a.m. – Back to work on the shower with Frank. We worked to resolve moisture issue in the pipeline. I worked on the weld to patch. Pipe had been brazed together and not soldered so that is why torch is not releasing the elbow I am attempting to remove and re-solder. So I do a re-solder without removal of the elbow. Also had a pinhole leak and filled with J-B Weld epoxy; 4 hour cure time so turn the water supply valve on by 3:00 p.m. today.

11:00 a.m. – Completed the shower repair for the day and headed back to Mercator Isle. Checked over the wire causing light outage and fixed.

12:00 noon – Came back to the shop and unloaded tools. Went to the pool room and did some maintenance on the pool and spa filters. Cleaned the pump skimmer baskets, cleaned the pool skimmer baskets and back flushed all the filters. Retested the spa water chemistry and adjusted.

12:45 p.m. - Clocked out and went home.

Hopefully this gives us a better understanding of the daily Maintenance activities and how fortunate we are to have a multi-talented staff capable of handling the wide variety of issues involved in maintaining a 35-year-old community.

Pa/Grandpa! What is there to do around here?

What should we do with the kids or grandkids this summer? Have you asked that question in your family? Well, the Men's Club heard a speaker who can help you in answering that question. On Tuesday May 20, 2008 Lara Hughes from the Ocean Institute in Dana Point Harbor spoke about all the activities they put on geared specially for children, from pre-school youngster to high school students. For example, last year approximately 116,000 kids participated in programs at the Institute. The programs focus on marine science, marine ecology, Maritime History, California History, land ecology to name just a few of the programs. They allow kids to touch marine animals in their touch tanks, to investigate marine life seen through a microscope, to experience a sailor's life aboard a square-rigger (The Pilgrim) on an overnight stay, or to do research in the ocean onboard one of the Institute's research vessels. They offer weekend adventures, week-long day camps, multi-day overnight camps, parent-child overnight camps, build-a-boat-challenge, all based on age appropriate groups. Lara Hughes is the Manager of the institute's Adopt-a-Class Program, which raises donations to bring under-privileged children to experience the ocean environment; many of these kids will see the ocean or be on a boat for the first time. Since the Institute and all its programs are funded by private donations and membership fees, they, of course, will welcome any memberships/donations one wishes to give them. The Institute has been leading children on expeditions into the wonders of our marine environment for more than 20 years. So check it out. Call 949-496-2274 for more information. could be done in one day. A November *Harvest Fling Dance* drew 150 dancers. Other Thursday gatherings heard speakers on a wide range of subjects, saw demonstrations of cooking, flower arranging, exercises and, remember the seventies, a psychologist, Helen Smith, spoke on "Streaking – In the Here and Now" and later guided a "free flowing" rap session! Sometimes they brought needlework and just talked. There was often a card game or two before the meetings.

The "Ladies Coffee Clatch," as they named themselves, elected Adelle Shanta, Florence Mascari and Harriet Feiner as chairwomen in November, 1973. Adele Shanta, one of those three original officers, lives on Windlass Drive and, in reminiscing about the early days, remembers that the women had so much fun at their Thursday gatherings, doing crafts, playing cards or, as you can read herein, eating lunch out and going on day trips. Adelle held several offices over the years and is pleased that the Club is still active and carrying on those early traditions. She recounted that they all decided the Club would be mostly for recreation rather than charitable works since each member had her own interests in that area. By May, 1974 the group had adopted by-laws with officer positions that continue still with the addition of a parliamentarian in 1997.

Responding to the drastic gasoline shortages in those early 1970s, the women had a fuel saving day when members walked to the Community Center and carpooled to the Laguna Niguel commuter bus for a trip to Fashion Island. The bus trips to the Getty Center, Olvera Street, the Queen Mary, Sea World, the Music Center, L.A. County Art Museum, etc. were frequent and inexpensive: \$3 per person to the Getty Museum included bus fare, and \$4.50 to Sea World included bus fare and admission in 1974-75. In 1978 the first salad/dessert luncheon was held—hot dishes were eliminated and still are. The crafts group made, among

other things, the "sound banners" shown in the photo of the Community Center to "achieve the acoustical effectiveness hoped for." Evidently the staff person was eliminated in the late 1970s as the member-arranged programs began. There were now 90 members.

The 1980s: In 1982 Stanley Cummings spoke to the women about the newly completed Orange County Marine Institute and, in 1983, members toured the Ritz Carlton Hotel before its official opening. It seems the organization

was on top of everything going on throughout Southern California as the litany of trips and speakers indicate. Of course, the Del Mar Race Track was included as they joined with the Men's Club for what we hope were profitable trips down there.

A fashion show in 1986 consisted solely of clothes made by Niguel Shores women. The fashions were called "Dolphin Originals" and were modeled by members as seen in the photo. Another bit of local history that the Women's Club brought to its members was a talk in November 1986 by Pat Bates, then president of the Laguna Niguel Community Council (and subsequently mayor, a member of the State Assembly and, now, a member of the Orange County Board of Supervisors) who spoke about a petition to keep Monarch Beach as part of Laguna Niguel in the upcoming vote on cityhood for Dana Point. As we know, that did not happen. That same year the group visited the L. A. County Art Museum to see the Russian collection of Impressionist art. Subsequent trips took them to an NBC Studio for a tour and taping of a show, and yet others to the Descanso Gardens, Sherman Gardens, the Ritz Carlton Gardens, and the Fuscia Gardens in Carlsbad. As you can see, they didn't miss much and, I might add, there was also the Hortense Miller Garden in Laguna Beach.

The 1990s: The Craft Classes made quilts and knit hats for babies at the Children's Hospital, had some history lessons from Jaroldeen Edwards about Christopher Columbus and Anne of Cleves (she survived a 6-month marriage to Henry VIII). There were celebrities, too: Stephanie Edwards, long-time co-host of the Tournament of Roses on KTLA, spoke to the club; Gracie Boyd, widow of William "Hopalong Cassidy" Boyd recounted her "Life with Hoppy," and Melinda Lee, radio personality who

conducted the daily Food News Hour on KNX, contributed her expertise and answered members' questions. Somewhere along the way a Wine and Cheese December holiday party was initiated to which members' spouses were invited as well as members of the Men's Club and their spouses. This has remained an annual event.

Dana Point came to the Women's Club in the person of Colene Schwandt, Vice-Chairman of the Cultural Commission and Project Director for the Cultural Plan (long since abandoned) along with Wendy Lockwood-Larson, past-chairman of the Cultural Commission. They spoke about Art in Public Places and the Whale Festival. During this

period the Women's Club donated, for the multi-purpose room, two paintings depicting nearby beaches by local artist, Ruth Basler Burr.

A glimpse into the future was provided by a visit to Regent's Point, the senior living facility in Irvine, to which a number of Niguel Shores residents moved in later years. The resident home tours were started by the Women's Club during this time with many members opening their homes for viewing over the years. Members were informed of the many opportunities for travel through the Elderhostel programs, the Club produced a cookbook called *Dolphin Delights*, lots of quilts were made for young victims of AIDS, lots of hot dogs were sold on the Fourth of July and lots of clothes were admired at the annual fashion shows. In 1999 the members were shocked and saddened at the loss of two of their most active members, Dottie Foth and Barbara Peever along with their husbands, in a bizarre plane accident.

The new millennium: Ever busy with trips and, true to their aims of fun, friendship and service to the community, a position had been created in the Club to bring "Care and Concern" to members and their families in time of illness. This person is to be notified in the event of a member's need for meals, transportation or other problems about which the Women's Club members can help. The Women's Club carried on the traditions


We will again have a Book Exchange Table for members who wish to bring books that they have finished reading to trade for books from other members.



Keeping up with these Joneses is a real challenge.

Cyril and Ann Jones were Niguel Shores pioneers having bought a lot in 1971 and built the house you see in the accompanying photo—a house which has since been transformed by a major remodel. How they got here is a story of a peripatetic life. Cyril, with his Welsh name, Jones, was born in Llanrwst, Wales; a mining town in northern Wales. Ann comes from Redruth, Cornwall, another mining town (the connection becomes obvious later). Ann's father was a miner in the tin mines of Cornwall, took his family to work in the gold mines near Johannesburg where Ann lived until seven and learned Afrikaans. The family then came back to Cornwall.

Cyril spoke the Welsh language until eight when he learned English. He worked in the mines in Wales, went to a mining college, was drafted, had a serious bout with meningitis, went to work in the copper mines in Zambia (Northern Rhodesia at the time) to accrue enough money

to go back to mining college which was, you might have guessed, in Cornwall. There, now affluent enough to have a Morris Minor, he went to a dance where he met and was smitten with the pretty, petite Ann Mary Williams now, at age 20, a bank teller. He gave Ann a ride home and that was the end of his bachelorhood. They soon married, came in 1958 to Missouri where

Cyril obtained a master's degree in mining engineering at the famous Missouri School of Mines. Then came their first stay in California in Riverside where Cyril worked for the American Cement Company developing new products and Ann "walked downtown and got a job in a bank."

In 1960 they went back to South Africa when an offer came to Cyril from DeBeers for an engineering job at its great Kimberley Diamond mine. As a mining engineer he was involved in designing shafts that went 12,000 feet into the earth in search of diamonds which occur in volcanic pipes at such great depths. A couple of years later, faced with a choice of moving into a higher position in Johannesburg or returning to further schooling in the

U.S., they chose to return to California where Cyril was offered a fellowship at UC Berkeley, and obtained there an MBA in Finance and a doctorate in mining engineering. Along the way a son and daughter had arrived, well traveled babies indeed. Cyril then returned to the American Cement Company, now in Los Angeles where he became vice president, and traveled the world working on various projects. They lived in Altadena, nearly lost their house in land slide, moved to Calabasas and

> then, the company moved to Newport. Hence, their subsequent move to Niguel Shores.

> In 1973 a move to The Palmieri Company as vice president to handle many of the non-railroad coal-producing assets of the failed Penn-Central Railroad took Cyril off to offices in Pennsylvania with weekend visits to his home in California. Over the years other finance related posi-

tions shifted his career toward that area. Semi-retired at present, he still accepts projects that carry him off to farflung places which add to his millions of accumulated frequent flier miles!

Ann, meanwhile, has been active in the Niguel Shores Women's Club and has just been elected treasurer for the upcoming year—seems appropriate with her banking experience. The Joneses have a place in Mammoth, love to ski and Cyril is a great runner and daily user of our pool. Their grandchildren live nearby and are often there to seek help with their homework or, access to fun and games on Cyril's computer. So, you see why these Joneses are hard to keep up with!


